A Message from Mrs Przibilla

Over the next 2 weeks our Year 3 and 5 students will participate in NAPLAN testing. Students will begin with the Writing test on Wednesday the 15th followed by tests on Reading, Grammar (Conventions of Language) and concluding with Numeracy in Week 8. All students react differently when faced with tests, some enjoy the challenge and the ability to participate digitally, while others may find the process stressful or overwhelming. It is important that both schools and families support children through this process.

- Let your child lead conversations around NAPLAN. Media attention and constant conversations around NAPLAN can cause worry and concern for students that previously had none.
- If your child shares that they are worried or stressed, reassure them that these feelings are normal and provide them with ways they might be able to manage those feelings.
- Ensure your child is well rested, has a healthy breakfast and has the opportunity to do some physical activity on the mornings of testing days.
- Be calmand positive about the testing process.
- Remember that the test only captures a snapshot of your child's education and that
 they possess so many other talents and abilities that are not tested by NAPLAN.

The Premier's Reading Challenge is a challenge endorsed by, Steven Marshall, the Premier of South Australia. The purpose of this annual program is to build a love of reading in our students, to get them to read more books and highlight the importance of excellence in reading education to give our students the best opportunities for success in their future. In 2022 the students of Karrendi did so well in this challenge that we were one of 55 schools invited to attend the PRC Reception and receive a collection of new books to add to our school library. We hope to achieve the same in 2023!

Students will be supported in their involvement in the challenge by their classroom teachers and peers to meet the requirements of the challenge and earn their reward, whether that be a certificate a medal or their name on the Hall of Fame Honour Roll. For our avid readers and those who would like a bit of an extra challenge; being that this is the 20th year of the challenge there is the opportunity for students to receive an additional reward for their hard work. For each student that reads and records 20 books within the competition timeframe, they will receive a special 20th Anniversary Certificate in addition to their usual PRC Award this year.

Last year 124, 885 students completed the challenge across South Australia. I wonder how many will complete it this year. Happy reading!

Classroom Correspondence

In Room 21 we have been developing our number sense through playing a variety of number games. Students learnt how to play, 'Dotty Six' which involves students making 6 by rolling a dice with a partner, once one of them make six get a tick and the first one that gets 3 in a row wins. Another game learnt is, 'Ten Frame Filler' which is similar to, 'Dotty Six' however students had to make 10 instead of 6. Both of these new games have students engaged, participating and excited to partake in Maths.

What is the Challenge?

The Premier's Reading Challenge is a literacy engagement program that was introduced by the Premier in 2004 to:

- Encourage students to read more books and enjoy reading
- Improve literacy levels.

The Challenge requires students to read 12 books between the beginning of the school year and early September.



Encouraging students to read more books and enjoy reading.

How to complete the Challenge?



To complete the Premier's Reading Challenge students need to read 12 books between week 1, term 1 and week 7 term 3.

Every student will need a Student Reading Record. This can be collected from classroom teachers or is available from the Premier's Reading Challenge website.

Read 12 books. Eligible books include e-books, audio books, class/shared reading, prescribed books for school, non-fiction books, books read as research for assignments or books in another language.

Reception to year 6: Students must read 8 books from the Premier's Reading Challenge booklist and 4 personal choice books.

Complete the Student Reading Record with the title and author for each book. A parent, caregiver, teacher or librarian must sign off on each book to verify it has been read.

Pass on the completed Student Reading Record to the class teacher by the designated due date.

Receive an award in late November.

20-Book Challenge in 2023

2023 marks 20 years of the Premier's Reading Challenge in South Australia! To celebrate this momentous occasion, students are offered the opportunity to receive a special, 20th Anniversary certificate in addition to their usual PRC award this year. To qualify for this certificate, students need to read 20 books in 2023, and fill out the "20 Years, 20 Books" student reading record *instead of* the usual 12 book record. The reading limits for each age group are as follows:

Reception to year 6 – 8 books from the PRC book list, and 12 free choice titles

Students who complete the 20-book challenge will have also completed the 12 book challenge hence will receive the usual award as well.

The 20-book challenge is intended to be a voluntary, enjoyable, extension of reading for pleasure for those students who choose this option.



Challenge Details

Start: Now Finish: 8th September 2023 Number of books: 12 (or 20 for the additional challenge)

Where do I get a reading record? You can download one from the PRC webpage or ask the classroom teacher

Can parents read the book to their child? Yes. Where possible, we would like the students to read the books themselves however, involvement in the reading of a book meets the requirements of the challenge.
