


First, we looked at the **DRSABCD** emergency action plan. Then the instructor Helen from the St. John Ambulance service demonstrated how to present the recovery position. We then tried ourselves.

After the practice, we learned how to do CPR. We then practiced CPR on baby and adult mannequins. We absorbed information about how to bandage someone's arm when they sliced it. Practicing bandaging someone's arm was exciting and fun!





We then learned how to use an epipen. We then used a fake epipen to practice on each other. Then, we received First Aid bags with activities and a certificate. It had many procedures to follow! Upper Primary students also got a bandage and gauze pad.

Overall, the first aid training was extraordinary and enjoyable and we have now become professional first aiders. Thanks Frau Shahrooei for organising the training as part of our Health studies.
